How Things Were Done in 1990

Deb Elsas, daughter of PLATO founder Bob Elsas, recently donated some of her father's papers concerning PLATO's early years. One of the most interesting pieces was a single piece of paper, printed on both sides and dated 1990, that served as the equivalent of our modern website, weekly e-mail, fall course list, annual meeting notice, and membership form.

The 1990 general meeting was held at the Wisconsin Historical Society in a room that comfortably seated about 25. PLATO was rightfully proud that it increased the number of fall courses by 67%—from three to five. (This past fall, PLATO announced 51 courses.) Its membership stood at 72. (Today we are nearing 1,300 members.)

It is interesting to note how PLATO's founders chose courses with lasting popularity. The 1990 courses consisted of Short Stories, Current Events, Biography, Reminiscence Writing, and the Psychology of Religious Experience. Nearly thirty years later, four of those courses still appear in PLATO's offerings, and two of them still meet on the same day of the week as they did in 1990.
